

Cuyama Valley Food Action Network

- Provide healthy, locally grown and produced food to more members of the Cuyama community (addressing the issue of being a food desert in an agriculture community)


Market Cuyama Valley raw and value-added products to a wider regional audience

Though the Small Farm Program has a number of official small farm advisors, each county office of the University of California Cooperative Extension (UCCE) has a specialist who has been designated a small farm contact. Farm advisors extend useful, technical, and research-based information to producers in their counties. They provide leadership on local subject matter and expertise in assigned areas to determine and evaluate clientele problems. Major issues small farm advisors consider are: improvement of production practices, resource management, pest management, food safety, worker safety, postharvest handling, alternative crops, enterprise and market analysis, and agricultural education to the public.

Grants to be aware of:

California BIPOC Farmer & Land Steward Relief Fund that will be opening up on Monday, May 16th for farmers and producers that were affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. This grant program is funded through CDFA's California Underserved and Small Producer (CUSP) Program, but CDFA is collaborating with an organization called **Mandela Partners** who will be in charge of administering the funding and the application process.

This is a statewide program, eligible applicants in all regions of the state can apply. Depending on the region, CDFA can provide technical assistance with the application process through partnerships with different regional organizations. Grant amounts will range from \$1,000 to \$20,000 depending on funding availability and estimated economic losses, and the application will be available starting on Monday, May 16th and remain open for one month, at the following website:

This is some of the information on the eligibility and focus of the grant program:


- (1) Black, Indigenous, or Person of Color led farms and food-growing projects (including individuals, nonprofits, tribes, businesses). Businesses must be majority BIPOC owned. Nonprofits must be majority BIPOC staff and majority BIPOC board.
- (2) Applicant and their farm or food-growing project must be located in California.
- (3) Applicant demonstrates negative financial impact to themselves or their farm or food-growing project and need for assistance to cover basic needs.
- (4) Applicant's total net assets is less than \$200,000 for a family of 3 or more (\$150,000 for family of 2, or \$100,000 for family of 1), excluding a house or farmland.
- (5) Must have at least 1 year of sales

The following USDA grant supports direct to consumer markets like farmers markets and CSAs.

 Farmers Market Promotion Program (FMPP): Awards funding for capacity building, community development, training, and technical assistance. These grants can be used for market startup, operation, infrastructure, training and education, outreach, market analysis and planning, customer and producer surveys, vendor and customer recruitment, and new venue establishment. 4. Farm to School Incubator Grant Program - CDFA

The California Department of Food and Agriculture Office of Farm to Fork (CDFA-F2F) 2021 California Farm to School Incubator Grant Program is focused on supporting local and regional farm to school projects that promote nutrition education, sustainable food production and procurement, and high-quality student engagement through experiential learning.

Non-profits; Schools (K-12)



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5. Healthy Stores Refrigeration Grant Program

Through this program, CDFA funds energy efficient refrigeration units in corner stores and small businesses in low-income or low-access areas throughout the state to stock California-grown fresh produce, nuts and minimally processed foods. The purpose of the program is to improve access to healthy food choices in the small retail environment for underserved communities, while promoting CA-grown agriculture. Program Type: Economic Development; Healthy Food Systems Eligible Entities: Farmers and Ranchers; Government; Higher Education; Non-Profit; Other Business

6. Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition Program

The Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition Program is 100 percent federally funded and provides seniors 60 years of age or older who are on a limited income one-time box of fresh produce from local farmers throughout California.

Program Type: Healthy Food Systems

Eligible Entities: Federal / State / Local government; Non-profits

Depending on how things develop, CVFAN or another entity will be well-positioned for this USDA grant next year:

 Value-Added Producer Grant (VAPG) - Local Agriculture Marketing Program (LAMP) -Planning Projects: up to \$75,000; Working Capital: \$250,000 Guidelines

Independent producers, agricultural producer groups, farmer- or rancher-cooperatives, and majority-controlled producer-based business ventures, as defined in the <u>program regulation</u>, are eligible to apply for this program.

Deadline: April 25, 2022 for online applications and May 2, 2022 for paper applications.

American Rescue Plan Technical Assistance Investment to Benefit Underserved Farmers, Ranchers and Forest Landowners Grant Program:

The primary goal of American Rescue Plan Technical Assistance Investment Program is to ensure improved understanding of and equitable participation in the full range of USDA programs and services among underserved farmers, ranchers, forest land owners and operators through supporting the organizational delivery of technical assistance projects and establishment of technical assistance networks. USDA is authorized to support and facilitate the establishment of technical assistance projects toward this goal. Projects must provide a range of technical assistance services to underserved agricultural producers. The term "agricultural producer" is used to refer to agricultural farmers, ranchers, and private forest land owners and operators.

Community Facilities Direct Loan & Grant Program

The USDA Rural Development (RD) is seeking proposals for the Community Facilities Direct Loan & Grant Program. This program provides affordable funding to develop essential community facilities in rural areas. An essential community facility is defined as a facility that provides an essential service to the local community for the orderly development of the community in a primarily rural area, and does not include private, commercial or business undertakings.



How may funds be used?

Funds can be used to purchase, construct, and / or improve essential community facilities, purchase equipment and pay related project expenses.

Examples of essential community facilities include:

- Health care facilities such as hospitals, medical clinics, dental clinics, nursing homes or assisted living facilities
- Public facilities such as town halls, courthouses, airport hangars or street improvements
- Community support services such as child care centers, community centers, fairgrounds or transitional housing
- Public safety services such as fire departments, police stations, prisons, police vehicles, fire trucks, public works vehicles or equipment
- Educational services such as museums, libraries or private schools
- Utility services such as telemedicine or distance learning equipment
